Savannas Preserve has seen many new beginnings in its life as a state park, just as nature carved and transformed the landscape that formed its foundation. These lands that once formed a coastal dune and lagoon have changed to the Scrub Ridge and Freshwater Basin Marsh that form its landscape today. The next couple months mark the next new beginning in the park. During this time we will open the doors on a new addition to our education center, bringing in a new wealth of knowledge to youth. We will also open the gates on a new canoe launch on the St. Lucie River, bringing new recreational opportunities. Construction crews are currently putting the finishing touches on both of these projects, allowing us to provide many more outdoor activities during the cooler months ahead.

Savannas' premiere education center initially opened its doors 14 years ago. Since then, it has been the hub of the park and has educated many school children on the "wilds of nature." The new addition

includes a working science lab to provide students a more in-depth study of nature. It offers added lecture space to share the park's precious resources to an ever expanding audience. It will



be amazing to watch as the "new" and the "old" blend and expand the opportunities for park visitors.

Our other project, a new recreational facility, is being created across from the Walton Road Publix on US1. The new Evans Creek Canoe Launch will be a gateway to North Fork of the St. Lucie River. The new facility will provide visitors with greater access to recreational opportunities in this portion of the park—a chance to paddle and see a natural creek, teeming with wading birds and other wildlife, and to see a natural landscape in the middle of an ever-expanding city. The new facility will bind the two areas of the park, the Savannas-Basin Marsh and the Savannas-St. Lucie River, together as one.

Park staff and volunteers are looking forward to many exciting changes. With these new beginnings will be the creation of new memories, new recreational adventures, and new educational opportunities.



The Florida Scrub-Jay Alphelocoma coerulescens

The Florida Scrub-Jay is gray and blue, and about the size of a Mockingbird. Males and females have similar plumage and look alike. They are only found in certain areas of Florida and are entirely dependent on scrub habitats, characterized by several species of "scrub" oaks. Plants found in the scrub are adapted to live in well-drained, sandy, nutrient-poor soils, and are dependent on periodic fires. These plants can withstand high seasonal rainfall and extended periods of drought. Scrub-Jays prefer oaks 3 to 10 feet tall and bare sandy openings in the soil where they can bury acorns. The majority of the Scrub-Jays on the Treasure Coast live in Jonathan Dickinson State Park and here at the Savannas Preserve State Park. Their territory here at the Savannas is on the sandy ridge beside the train tracks from Jensen Beach to just north of the FPL power lines.

The birds are omnivores, eating insects, frogs, reptiles, berries, seeds, and acorns. It is estimated that each Jay harvests and buries 6,000 to 8,000 acorns from August to November for use throughout the year.

The Jays mate for life and do not migrate, but occupy and protect a territory about 25 acres in size. These birds generally do not travel more than 5 miles from where they were hatched. This species is one of the few cooperative breeding birds in the United States. The fledging Jays usually remain with their parents in the territory as "helpers" and will assist in the care

of the new siblings, feeding and protecting them. These close-knit family groups have up to 8 members. Studies have shown that breeding pairs with helpers successfully raise more young than do lone pairs. Cooperative breeding benefits the parent birds by increasing defense and care of the young, and also benefits the helpers, as they learn parenting skills prior to raising their own young. A helper is elevated to breeder status once it has acquired its own territory. They may replace a breeder in a nearby territory, take over part of their parent's territory, inherit breeding status after death of a parent, or establish a new territory between existing ones.

Scrub-Jays are protected by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC). The species has been listed as threatened by the state since 1975 and by the FWC since 1987. In spite of protection by the Endangered Species Act, the greatest decline of this species has occurred during the last 20 to 25 years, with an estimated 25 to 50 percent reduction in Jay numbers. Loss of habitat due to development has led to increased failed nesting attempts. Other threats come from predation from natural predators such as bobcats, owls, raptors, snakes, and sometimes crows. Domestic cats pose a serious threat in suburban areas, as well as poisoning and collisions with cars.

You can help by:

- Supporting the park that manages the habitat for optimal protection of the Jays.
- Providing Habitat for Scrub-Jays. Plant, protect, and cultivate patches of scrub live oak, Chapman's oak, myrtle oak, and scrub oak on your property.
- Protect Scrub-Jays from your pets. Encourage passage and strict enforcement of leash laws for dogs and cats in your community.
- Restrict use of pesticides. The Jays feed on insects usually considered pests around homes. Pesticides may limit or contaminate food used by the birds.
- ▶ Report malicious destruction or harassment of Scrub-Jays or their nests to the park manager or park biologist at 772-340-7530.
